

FENDER BOARDS PIPES

If you've been around boating long enough, especially if you do some traveling, you've likely heard of fender boards. They are handy devices that keep your boat off of the lock wall or span across a piling at a fixed dock. We all know that trying to center a fender in the "perfect" spot against a pole can be a small but meaningful pain in the backside.

Fender boards are used across the marine industry to protect the vessel and reduce the risk of damage. Most of the fender boards I've ever seen consist of a 2x4 or 2x6 strapped across two fenders and tied to the boat. Until I moved our boat to Annapolis, with its fixed docks everywhere, I hadn't thought much about making them for us. But, times are changing and I'm starting to see the value.



While doing their amazing trip up thru Canada, Vicky Carr came across an article written by a lady who created a lighter weight version of the fender board using appropriately sized PVC pipe. This light weight build would surely be easier to handle and store. It wouldn't be subject to rot.

I think I'll be doing some research on this and perhaps I'll build a set for us before we travel south.

Overtaking/Slow Passing In A Really Narrow Inland Waterway

This piece is part of a series. Each is referenced below and can be found on the Prince William Yacht Club website. The series has to do with aspects of wakes, handling wakes, passing, traveling narrow (as opposed to really narrow) waterways, each of us staying to the starboard side of a channel, etc. As always these are the thoughts of one person. Everyone is on their own out there


- 1. The Lifeline, Narrow Inlets, Etc. October 2021.
- 2. The Lifeline, "Big Boy Power Boats (BBPBs); The Narrow Occoquan River Channel," October 2022.

Overtaking and the Rule. The picture below shows an overtaking scenario. Note which vessel is the stand-on

vessel and which is the give-way vessel. As an aside, neither of these vessels are entitled to something called "the right-of-way". Each vessel has its own responsibilities.

Stand-on vessels should continue to keep moving at the same speed and in the same direction. Give-way vessels have the responsibility of signaling their intentions to the stand-on vessel. It is also her responsibility to maneuver herself around the other in a safe manner. A give-way vessel may also be called the burdened vessel. Another name for the stand-on vessel is the privileged vessel. According to the Rules, a burdened vessel must give way to a privileged vessel.

Whenever in a passing scenario on inland waters, the stand-on vessel, acknowledges the intended actions of the give-way vessel if she agrees with the intention. The stand-on vessel must maintain



her agreed to course and speed until the give-way vessel passes and is clear. The stand-on vessel always has the option of sounding the danger signal (*Rule 34--five rapid, short blasts*) if she does not understand the intentions or actions of a give-way vessel. Or, if she is in doubt whether sufficient action is being taken by the other to avoid a collision.

Whether it is a slow pass on the Intracoastal waterway (ICW) or a normal pass anywhere else on Inland waters, Rule 13 Inland is the Rule to follow:

(a) Notwithstanding anything contained in Rules 4 through 18, any vessel overtaking any other shall keep out of the way of the vessel being overtaken.

- (b) A vessel shall be deemed to be overtaking when coming up with another vessel from a direction more than 22.5 degrees abaft her beam; that is, in such a position with reference to the vessel she is overtaking, that at night she would be able to see only the stern light of that vessel but neither of her side lights.
- (c) When a vessel is in any doubt as to whether she is overtaking another, she shall assume that this is the case and act accordingly.
- (d) Any subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall not make the overtaking vessel a crossing vessel within the meaning of these Rules or relieve her of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she is finally past and clear.

Whenever one vessel is overtaking another vessel, the vessel being overtaken ALWAYS has precedence. It should be allowed to continue unhindered. This is the case even if the vessel behind has a higher level of right-of-way priority.

According to Rule 18 Inland, for example, a sailboat being driven solely by the wind with no mechanical propulsion normally would have a higher level in the pecking order than a power boat. However, the same sailboat would have to cede to the fastest speed boat on the water if that speed boat was to be going at a nowake speed and the sailboat wished to make a pass.

The Etiquette of Making A Slow Pass in a Really, Really Narrow Inland Waterway. The idea in making a slow pass is for the give-way vessel and the stand-on vessel to create the least amount of wake as is possible. Proper boating etiquette relies on passing in a manner appropriate to the conditions and being mindful of the rights of others using a channel. It is not proper etiquette to pass someone in a manner that negatively affects a vessel which is where it is supposed be and doing what it is supposed to be doing according to the accepted Rules of the Road.

The slow pass starts with the give-way and stand-on vessel communicating to reach agreement on what will occur. What is written in Rule 34 Inland states that the stand-on vessel must agree to any proposal made by the give-way vessel or tell the give-way vessel when, where, and/or how to make the slow pass. If the stand-on vessel has any doubts about what the give-way vessel wants to do she shall sound the danger signal of five short blasts (Rule 34 Inland).

Vessels in a passing scenario usually initiate contact by VHF on either 16 and moving somewhere else or 13. The give-way vessel might note the stand-on vessel's name visually or with AIS. Often the call is, "Sailing vessel southbound approaching Red 156, this is...." The two vessels agree between themselves on the conditions of the slow pass.

Using a whistle/horn or flashing lights are other options (Rule 34 Inland). When in sight of one another: (i) a power-driven vessel intending to overtake another power-driven vessel shall indicate her intention by the following signals on her whistle: one short blast to mean "I intend to overtake you on your starboard side"; two short blasts to mean "I intend to overtake you on your port side." The power-driven vessel about to be overtaken shall, if in agreement, return the signal.

Those making agreement over the VHF need not sound the whistle signals prescribed by this Rule, but may do so. If agreement is not reached through the radio, then whistle signals shall be exchanged in a timely manner and shall prevail.

Beware the Laws of Physics. The laws of physics must be expected to exert themselves whenever two vessels in a narrow, narrow channel pass. Speed differentials, vessel design differences, vessel size differences, sudden speed changes by one vessel or the other, etc. may lead to water pressures that cause unfamiliar movements of either or both vessels.

Bows may move away from each other while at the same time sterns may approach. A wake created by a larger vessel may pushed a smaller vessel outside an already narrow, narrow channel and into a rapidly shoaling area. In many cases speed control and prior planning prevents or goes a long way toward mitigating issues.




