

Paddles, Region A & B Plus Tubing

A word to the wise from Mario Vittone, retired Coast Guard rescue swimmer, maritime safety, rescue, and survival expert. From <u>Soundings</u>, pg. 30, July 2019.

"I don't know how many rescue missions I've completed. I also don't know how many accident reports I've read, or how many cases from other rescuers I've studied. What I do know is this: With the exception of some medevacs, every rescue resulted from a mistake the captain made before leaving the dock. I've never seen or heard of a mayday call that didn't begin with an error in planning."

<u>DISCLAIMER...DISCLAIMER...AS USUAL</u>, <u>EVERYONE IS ON THEIR OWN OUT THERE</u>. What follows are one person's thoughts based on hours traveling the Occoquan and the Potomac from DC down to where the Potomac River meets the Chesapeake Bay.

- 1. Things appear to be moving along with the paddle driven vessels in front of our fairways and close by waters. It is a never-ending project to get/keep all stakeholders moving forward.
 - Don has been spending time with the people at the park across the Occoquan explaining to the vendor the need for improved safety discussions with those who rent kayaks and paddle boards.
 - The kayak paddles from those renting from the Northern VA park location should have reflectors on the front and back that catch the sun. Mason Neck rentals has received reflectors and say that they will be using them on their paddles also. According to the Coast Guard Auxiliary, this should improve the ability to see low riding vessels from a distance.

There Should Be Some Reflectors Available In The PWM Parts Department. Please Email Me If There Are None There. I Will Do My Best To Track Some Down.

- Scott has his first draft of a navigation chart on which are outlined the less paddler-friendly areas of the Occoquan. Basically, these are spots in front of our marina and some of the others. We are waiting on Coast Guard Auxiliary input for a final edition.
- Cautionary signs should be going up shortly at the entrances/exits of our fairways. Evidently, they are ready to go and just waiting to be hung. Please remember to be careful entering and leaving the PWM fairways. Don't forget to use that one long blind spot blast of 5-6 seconds when entering or leaving the fairway.
- 2. With respect to lateral markers:
 - The United States is in Region B. Our region comprises the Americas (except Greenland), Japan, North and South Korea, the Philippines, Taiwan, Hawaii, and Easter Island. In Region B, the phrase "red right returning" may be used as a mnemonic, indicating that a red mark must be kept on the right when entering a harbor or river or moving toward the source of a river.
 - Region A comprises Europe, Africa, and most of Asia and Oceania, as well as Greenland. In Region A, the phrase "Is there any red port left?" (referring to the red color of the fortified wine "port") may be used as a mnemonic indicating that a red mark must be kept on the left when entering a harbor or river or moving toward the source of a river.
 - There are too many boaters who apparently think that the Potomac and Occoquan is in Region A.
 This is true of "big" boats or "small" boats. It is bad enough to see this happening in wide

channels where there is plenty of room. Things get tougher as space becomes an issue, such as going under a bridge or traveling in the narrow no wake zone.

While Rule 2 allows a ton of leeway in being on the red or green side of the channel, generally speaking, and in our region, we should be following the rule of red, right, return. Being in and on the wrong side of the channel because it is a quicker passage than being on the correct side may or may not fit into the Rule 2 basket.

3. A fair number of boats are leaving the boatel dock with tubes and kid(s) aboard who are excited to have a day on the water being pulled on a tube. Additionally, there are tubers all over the Potomac. Hearing the squealing voices of kids having a good time is one of the joys of boating.

Here are things seen, however, that appear to be intuitively dangerous.

• A potential prop strike is probably number one. Turning the engine(s) off when bringing a tube, tuber(s), and line onto the boat or perhaps even when putting the tube and tuber(s) in the water when starting off does not mean putting the engine in neutral. An inadvertent bump of the throttle may result in an engine that is in gear at the worst possible moment. A motor that is turned off lessens the danger considerably.

When picking up a tuber(s), engine(s) should probably be off until the operator visually confirms that the kid(s) are on board, the tube is stowed, and the line is away from the prop.

A boat driver who is also the observer. Googling the DC and MD legalities of towing a tube
requires that there be a competent observer in the boat in addition to the driver. They require the
observer to be at least 12 years old. According to Google, VA allows a pass on the observer if those
being towed are wearing Coast Guard approved PFDs.

DISCLAIMER...DISCLAIMER...EVERYONE SHOULD CHECK THE MOST UP-TO-DATE TOWING RULES FOR THE WATERS THEY WILL BE USING.

An operator who both drives the boat and looks over her/his shoulder at a tube being towed is a potential danger to other boaters in the area as well as the tuber(s) themselves. There are enough moving parts while driving a vessel without towing something at the end of a 75-foot line. Hauling youngster(s) behind only adds to the issues that might come up.

Not understanding the basic laws of physics. For example, it is important to realize that even
while traveling at a relatively slow speed of 21 mph, whipping a tube at the end of a 75-foot line
may cause the tube to move quite a bit faster than the boat is going.

A youngster(s) thrown from a tube being whipped around when the boat is turning may travel an unexpected distance and right into a zone of danger. A tube going too fast, possibly becoming airborne after hitting a wake, with a hard landing on a hard water surface is a recipe for injury.

• Tubing in an inappropriate location. A main channel, especially a narrow main channel probably is not the place to take the kids tubing. Nor is any place with a lot of boat movement. Boat traffic is a fact of life on the water during the summer months.

Obviously, the best place to drag kids around on a tube is on a patch of empty water free and clear of any fixed obstacles such as channel markers, etc. Like fishing holes, or that secret place to park a vehicle, these quiet places are best kept to one's self.




