Let's all be thankful and think of how we can help the besieged Ukrainian people...









appy April everyone. What a COW!! That's all I will say about that. Well, you will hear the distinct sound of marine engines rumbling soon if not


already. That is the sound of good times soon to be had on the water. The weather through March was crazy. And how about those gas prices? We will get back to normal I am sure.

I am not an electrician and do not profess to be, but CAN Bus connections, SEA TALK 1 to SEA TALKng, NMEA (pronounced NEE-MA) 2000, and the various other connections had me concerned of taking on the task of installing myself. By the way, SEA TALK is the Raymarine network wiring to their products.

All manufacturers have a help service and do not be afraid to call on them. They are very helpful, and they even ask you questions you may not have thought about. I have even had wiring diagrams sent on how to best connect everything. Pictures are a thousand words to me and there are boat owners that have taken on most tasks you may want to accomplish or need to. I have learned from this on quite a few Blog sites as well as from PWYC captains as well.

I am providing links to a few that you may be interested in using if you have questions yourself. But rest assured that someone out there has done something that may help your situation. I am now slightly more confident than I was before, but I know I will run into something I am not sure about. And I am sure I have at least one website I can go

to that will be able to answer whatever questions I have.

NAVIGATION GUIDELINES

After passing under the 14th street bridge spans:

- locate and hail photo boat, "Summer Daze" on Channel 68.
- follow the approximate float path marked in yellow on the diagram.
- · steer toward the Tidal Basin.
- close to shore, turn north and proceed slowly between the photo boat and the cherry trees.
- · watch depth and avoid obstructions.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

The yellow dot marks the location of the Photo Boat (Summer Daze). The yellow oval marks the Photo Zone in which photos will be taken. Tom Payne will take several photos of your boat, to include the blossoms and the Washington Monument in the background. If you want a photo showing your boat name, stop at some point and rotate your boat, to make the name visible to the camera. Resume your pass. If another boat enters the Photo Zone while you are passing, slow down until they pass so they don't "photo bomb" your pictures. If there is rain, snow, or high winds, the shoot will be cancelled. Be prepared with all appropriate documentation should the Coast Guard board your vessel.

Greetings all PWYC boaters! Have you ever been part of a progressive dinner party? They are great fun, a great way to meet new people, show off your home (or in this case your boat!), see other member's homes (boats!), and enjoy good food, fine drinks, and great friends. We have decided to bring back the PWYC Progressive Dinner on the Docks on Saturday, May 21st, and we really hope you can be a part of this fun filled event. Vicky Carr will be coordinating.

Here's how it works:

- -There will be a total of four courses served throughout the evening, each served on several different boats up and down the docks of PWM.
- -You will start your evening with cocktails & appetizers on your first assigned boat, then you will enjoy course of salad/soup on a second boat, followed by a main course on a third boat, and then dessert will be served at the Blue Bath House so everyone can meet, talk, and share their experiences. Each boat serving a course will host between 2 and 4 'guest' couples at their boat. Checklists From Mario

Most boaters feel fairly comfortable with how to operate their craft and likely give little thought to the actual tasks associated with safe operation. On the best day, overlooking something simple is a fairly easy to do. In an emergency, task saturation makes it nearly impossible without some sort of reference guide.

A written checklist is a type of task helper. They can be as complicated as a multilevel decision tree with many branches to simple shopping or to-do-lists. Developing a good checklist is not easy, but here are some thoughts on how to do it.

Checklists may be used to:

- Keep the mind focused on the task at hand, especially when surrounded by chaos or during an unexpected event.
- Reduce failure by compensating for potential limits of human memory and attention.
- Reduce the tendency to avoid, omit, or neglect important steps
- Ensure consistency and completeness in carrying out a task.
- Sharpen one's method of attack by eliminating wasted actions.

Checklists are commonly used, for example, in:

- Aviation pre-flights before an airplane leaves the ground.
- Putting together emergency survival kits to be sure that nothing is left out.
- Underwater diving to ensure that the diver and her/his life support systems are fully prepared before the water is entered.
- Ensure that best healthcare practices are followed.

A guest speaker, Mario Vittone, provided us some excellent checklist templates that will help us along towards our goal of boating as safely as we can. We are working on getting them uploaded to the PWYC site.

Below you'll find a couple outlines which may be used for developing a pre-departure brief. We will try to get all of the checklists Mario sent loaded onto our site to enable all members to have ready access. Three may be used to develop contingency plans for flooding, smoke/fire, and loss of power emergencies. The fifth may be used to pre-plan a trip. Make whatever changes you think necessary to meet your needs.

It would be worthwhile to view the recording of Mario's presentation to hear what he says about the need to develop other checklists. The recording is available on the Prince William Yacht Club website (PWYC.org)

PRE-DEPARTURE SAFETY BRIEF

Note: The captain being wrong is a real possibility and an occasional certainty. All hands are reminded to speak up, ask questions, and voice concerns.

Following all vessel and trip preparation checklists and before the final safety checklist, an all-hands pre-sail safety briefing should occur.

Sail plan and general safety:

- The intended route/destination and timing of the voyage including problem areas
- Expected weather conditions
- Experience level of all members of the crew and passengers including swimming ability
- Crew fitness / medical information for crew and passengers / medications
- Crew assignments for the trip (specifics who is responsible for what and when)
- Sail configurations required or intended
- Personal gear check (PFDs, harnesses, etc.)
- Lifejacket and harness policies
- Vessel hazard areas
- Vessel condition particulars
- Vessel safety check items discussed (requires hands on)

Communications plan:

- With whom
- Monitor Frequencies/channels
- Timing of check-ins and time considered overdue
- Contact information of responsible person ashore who holds the float/voyage plan

Emergency plans:

- Man overboard
- Captain overboard
- Fire
- Flooding
- Medical emergency
- Captain medical emergency

Public Education Course Flyer: Boat America



Boat America is a boating certificate class that offers an in-depth and interesting boating safety course, and provides the knowledge needed to obtain a boating certificate.

Some insurance companies will also offer discounts on boating insurance to boaters who successfully complete this course.

TOPICS INCLUDE

- Introduction to Boating Types of power boats, boating vocabulary, sailboats, paddle boats, powering boats, and engine types.
- Boating Law Boat registration, regulations, hull identification numbers, required safety equipment, Federal boating law, state boating law, and reporting accidents.
- Safety Equipment Life jackets, fire extinguishers, sound-producing devices, visual distress signals, anchors, and other safety equipment.

ou and your significant other have taken a trip, down the Potomac or to the Bay. You arrive at the marina, and you get a phone call of an urgent family matter. You rent a car, and your crew member leaves to handle the issue. You walk back to your boat. Look in the mirror, and wonder, "How am I going to get this thing back home?" You may not have planned to operate single handed, but there are situations, where you may be forced into it.

I've been operating my boat for the vast part of the past twenty years single handed. From upstate New York to the west coast of Florida. Here's a short article with some pointers that may help, should you decide, or find, yourself having to handle your boat single handed.

Most of the work for single handed boating occurs prior to the trip. One of the most important things to remember is. You should never rush! Planning thinking ahead is key.

Maintenance

Don't skimp on it. I keep notes on my boat. As soon as I identify an issue, I have it corrected. The \$500 issue that you were putting off to get corrected, you will gladly pay \$1,000, to have it fixed while you're on the water. A major concern while I'm traveling is a maintenance issue that occurs while underway. Has it happened to me? Yes. But I try to keep those occurrences to a minimum, and hopefully minor. It's not too bad if it occurs while the

waters are flat, and the winds are calm. But if you're in 3-4' waves, and the winds are blowing 15-25mph. It can become a major issue. Do yourself a favor, and get things fixed as soon as it's identified. (No Carlton didn't tell me to say that.)

Planning

Those on H dock have seen me numerous times, sitting at the helm of my boat, in the slip. I'm visualizing what I will need / want, while underway. I want to have everything I want at the helm pre departure. Inflatable life vest, hat, glasses, cell phone and charger, paper charts, drinks, power bar / snacks, sun block, jacket, hand held radio. I pre position, all of this before I start the blowers. Make sure your strata glass is clean, especially if you'll be running in less than perfect conditions (night, fog, rain). The worse the weather conditions, the more important it is to have everything you'll need, within easy reach. So, spend some time at the helm. What will I do if this happens? What will I want if that happens?

Departure

I preposition two or three lines on the transom seat. You're by yourself, so you don't care about the seating area. You just need enough to basically secure the boat when you arrive. If you need more, once in the slip, you can get them out later.

I place three fenders on the floor, against the transom seat, and I coil the lines and use them as chocks to keep

the fenders from rolling around. Again, I'm not concerned about them taking up floor space. How much walking around am I going to do?

The ships radio is set to 16. The handheld to 13. Electronics are turned on, radar is spinning, and the first way point is active, with the chart plotter set at the desired range.

If someone is there to hold the boat while you position the fenders, close the canvas if applicable, and close the transom door, that's great. If not. I throw everything on the boat. Leave the slip, and stop as soon as it's safe in the river, and get everything set. Then I take the helm and get underway.

Underway

Enjoy the ride, and be careful. Plan ahead. The more you plan ahead the less rushed you'll be and the fewer mistakes you'll make. If you need to leave the cockpit for any reason. Don your left vest, if it's not on already. Stop the boat. As good as a swimmer as you think you are. I'll bet you can't catch a boat at idle or no wake speed. Take it out of gear. If the wind or current is moving fast. Ask yourself. "Do I really need to leave the cockpit?" Most of the time, the answer will be, "No". Same thing if you need something from the transom locker. Stop the boat. Even consider shutting down the engines, to be sure the props are not turning. You have no one to depend on if the situation goes sideways.

As you're approaching your destination, I like to get something to eat, (For me it's two chocolate chip cookies, and a diet coke), and visit the head. Whatever you need to do to relax a little.

If you're en route to a Raft Up. Think about. Where were your fenders when you've rafted up the last time?

There are things I do like about operating single handed. It can be enjoyable. It doesn't have to be feared.

Arrival

Upon arrival, at a marina or if I'm rafting up. I'll stop a distance from the fairway / marina / raft to preset my lines and fenders. Again, stop the boat to do this. Talk with the marina or Raft Master and get as much information as you can prior to setting your lines and

fenders. Left side finger, is it short or long? Bow in / stern in? Floating or fixed? Slip assignment? What's the current and tide doing, if anything?

Last season, I went to National Harbor to meet one of my sons. The evening prior, they had emailed my slip assignment, as I was going to arrive prior to their normal hours. Upon arrival, I drove down the fairway, found my slip, figured out how I was going to set my lines and fenders. Looked at the water, trying to detect any motion. Looked for flags, for the wind. Backed out of the fairway to an open area. Stopped. Set my lines and fenders. Took a moment to breath, then headed into the slip. That's so much easier than putting the boat in the slip, then trying to get the lines out and set before the boat drifts away.


If there are dock hands there to help. I toss then a bow and a stern line, and ask then to just hold the boat. I go back to the helm, shut the engines down, then calmly walk back and start securing my lines. Often I get more assistance than desired. I try to (somewhat get rid of them as soon as I can. After politely), running for hours, I'm usually pretty spent. I want to slow things down. Some places have my boat tied up and the shore power connected, as if they're auditioning for a NASCAR pit crew. I find it frustrating. Once you are comfortable that the boat is secured, go below and get something to eat and drink before checking in. You'll feel more like a human. I'll guarantee, you'll be dehydrated, and hungry, no matter how well you prepared. Plus, your stress level is always higher, when operating single handed.

A detailed article would have been thirty pages, and each boat, and Captain will do things differently. The best system is the one that works for you. Think about things in advance. Practice, maybe just running to Mattawoman and back. Or the fuel dock. The pump out.

The more you plan ahead mentally. The more the deck will be stacked in your favor.


Be safe and have a good time on the water. I do.

If you've been to Old Town Alexandria or DC by water, you've probably passed 2 strange little buildings on the Virginia shore, just south of the Woodrow Wilson bridge. And, if you're like most of us, you probably never gave them a second thought.

But, did you know, on this site sits the very first cornerstone used to set the southern boundary of the nations capitol? In 1791, a free black man and self educated astronomer and surveyor from Maryland, Benjamin Banneker, was hired to make the astronomical observations and calculations necessary to establish the south corner of the square at Jones Point in Alexandria. According to legend, "Banneker fixed the

position of the first stone by lying on his back to find the exact starting point for the survey and plotting six stars as they crossed his spot at a particular time of night."

On April 15, 1791, the Alexandria Masonic Lodge placed a small, ceremonial stone on the south corner of Jones Point. Newspapers around the country announced the story of the beginning of the new federal city. In 1794, the ceremonial stone at Jones Point was replaced by a large stone, still in place today, with the inscription "The beginning of the Territory of Columbia" on one side.
