appy New Year to all you club members. May we have a productive and less hectic 2022 with lots of great boating weather. As your new Commodore, I am optimistic that we can continue the great legacy of PWYC in our 30th year! But first let me thank Immediate Past Commodore (IPC) Mike Connolly and his lovely wife Sherri for their great leadership during the last two years of Pandemic. He deftly handled difficult decisions to keep us all healthy and happy, all the while protecting our most vulnerable. I intend to carry on that policy of checking the CDC guidelines for COVID-19 ahead of all our events and using them to make a go-no go decision to protect members.

So, another year and a new Board of Directors for your Club was announced at the November Closing day festivities. Meet our Flag Officers...



...but first, how about a bit of history on the flags flown, etiquette and traditions?

Boats and yacht clubs are great users of flags. They are colorful, festive and informative. We should be familiar with the customs that apply to all the types of flags typically flown on a vessel.

A boat has a limited number of places from which to fly flags, and forcing the owner to be selective in the flags flown. A yacht or boat will ordinarily display three flags: one announcing her nationality, one announcing her owner's club affiliation, and one announcing her owner's status (private signal or club officer's flag).

National Ensign (50-Star US flag)

The familiar 50 star "stars and stripes" flag is also known as the National Ensign afloat. It is the most important flag on board and identifies her national character. A ship's national ensign is immediately recognizable because it flies farthest aft (the place of honor), but not necessarily from the highest point in the rig. With the possible exception of battle flags, and hopefully we won't being seeing much battle on the Occoquan, it should be the vessel's largest flag.

Normally the national ensign is flown from a staff on the vessel's stern. No other flag may be flown from this position. There are rules that require the flag to be lowered at sunset.

Club Burgee

Most yacht club burgees are pennant (three sided) shaped like the PWYC burgee, but a few clubs use swallow-tailed flags, while a very few use rectangular flags.

Flying the burgee is an important part of belonging to a yacht club and members of PWYC should fly our burgee with pride.

The burgee is flown from the bow staff on a powerboat, while most sailboats fly the burgee from the starboard spreader. Normally a vessel displays only one burgee at a time. Exceptions are made for opening day and other special occasions when owners will string together all burgees of clubs to which they belong, with the PWYC burgee at the top of the string for PWYC functions.

Officers Flags

The yacht ensign's circle of 13 stars surrounding an anchor forms the basis for the officer flags. The 13 stars represent the original 13 colonies found on the "Betsy Ross" flag with a fouled anchor in the union. The medallion configuration, was entered into official use in 1848, following an act of Congress that made it the official signal for U.S. pleasure sailing vessels. On powerboats, the officer flag is flown from the mast, with the club burgee keeping its place flown at the bow staff. Officer flags are flown only when the officer is aboard.

PWYC has 5 Flag Officers; Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, Secretary and Treasurer, each of which has their own flag of designation.

There is a lot more information about the history and use of nautical flags. As a recreational boater, you may never need to use the majority of these as you come and go

along the waterway. But knowing what they mean can be helpful out on the water, such as if you were to need assistance. Flying flags, especially the National Ensign, is actually more serious than most of us realize. You can find more information about our club flags in our PWYC Bylaws Article XI.



oaking in the sun and relaxing on the hook, or maybe towing the kids and getting in some skiing. We just can't wait for winter to be over. I know I occasionally suffer from the lack of water time, that's for sure.

Living at a marina, with a beautiful view of the Occoquan and Belmont Bay, hardly a day passes that I don't see a few hearty souls out there enjoying their boats as the temperature plummets. Interestingly enough, the vast majority are smaller boats with open cockpits and outboard motors. As a delivery captain myself, I've had the opportunity to run many boats in winter.

Cold weather boating requires a bit more planning and caution than during the warm summer days. Here are just a few tips to help you enjoy some cold weather time on your baby.

BUNDLE UP

The layered look is in for winter boating. Modern tech clothing fabrics are lightweight and provide more warmth than cotton. Start with a base layer of underwear that wicks sweat off your skin. Middle layers retain body heat to protect you from the cold. Trap the heat with polyester fleece, puffy insulated jacket or synthetic jacket. Top off your wardrobe with an outer layer to shield your body from the wind. Water-resistant and breathable shells are perfect for the job.

I purchased a "float coat" that I use when I do winter surveys and deliveries. It's a Type III PFD and is VERY warm. I got the safety yellow because I certainly want to be seen if something were to happen to you.

Remember, we lose a great deal of heat through the top of our head. As I've grown more "follicley" challenged, I'm learning to appreciate the value of a good hat. Function over fashion. Good socks are a must for the feet. Wear those with lightweight, comfortable boots with gripping soles. Add a pair of insulated gloves or mittens and you are dressed for the trip.

A towel, blanket and maybe a change of clothes in a dry sack isn't a bad idea either. I carry a couple granola bars and a bottle of water. There's usually something in every pocket.

DOUBLE CHECK YOUR SAFETY GEAR

Having the river all to yourself is wonderful, but don't count on passing boater to stop and lend a hand. Ensure you've got working flares, tow lines, anchor, and a fire extinguisher. One other, often missed item especially on smaller boats is a working VHF radio. On all of the boats I've ever owned, I've installed a radio and had a floating portable as back up. Everyone says, "Oh, I've got my cell", but it may not work if wet and you're not able to communicate directly with those who may come to your rescue.

FUEL UP

Make sure that tank is topped off before heading out. Marina hours change during the off season, so you may find your usual favorite fuel stop has become a ghost town.

FILE A FLOAT PLAN

"I don't need to do that, I'm just going out to the

power lines." I've heard it a million times but the truth is, it's really important to make sure that one or two people on land know you're out there and when you plan to return. They need to know the identifying information about the boat, number of people on board,

phone numbers etc. Make sure they know that if they don't hear from you or can't get in contact with you by 'X' time, call the authorities because you're overdue.

As a professional rescuer, I've spent many hours flying over the river searching for lost and missing boaters. It's no easy task and for the search teams. Our stress levels do rise as the clock ticks by. Trust me, we want nothing more than to celebrate a successful mission with everyone safely back on the dock. The more information we have, the more timely that information is, the greater the chance for success. Oh, and you're not bothering us, call. If you're located before we get there, BONUS!

I get it!! No one believes it will happen to them, but after nearly 36 years in public safety, I can tell you it can happen to any of us, so stack the deck in your favor. There's a link to filing a Float Plan on the PWYC Resources page. Check it out!

KNOW THE WEATHER

Make sure you have checked your favorite marine weather app or web service. A splash of the winter

Potomac is far less comfortable than a kiss from the summer Occoquan. Don't get caught in the cold winter blow.

WEAR A LIFEJACKET

If you've got a float coat like I do, you're fine. But, please, make sure you're wearing some sort of floatation device. If it's an automatic inflator, double check the cartridge and settings to ensure its working.

Remember, if you fall in, the shock from the cold will likely confuse you and prevent you from pulling the inflation handle.

inter boating can truly be very enjoyable. It just takes a little more preparation and focus. Bundle up! Pack the Yeti with some nice warm drink and hot soup. Slow down! And simply enjoy the peace and calm. Oh, leave the flip flops at home.




What do YOU want to see in the newsletter?

Thomas Mason, son of George Mason IV, built a ferry that was located two miles west of the mouth of the Occoquan River? It's exact location remains unclear, but it is believed to have been adjacent to an existing sanitary pump station near the RF&P railroad bridge, east of Routes 1 and I-95. Virginia Law set the ferry rates at 4 cents a man, 4 cents a horse.

His competition was another ferry started in 1791 by Col. John Hooe of Prince William County located in Occoquan.

In July, 1796, Mason commissioned Theodore Burr to build a wooden bridge to cross 105 yards of water. It was completed before June, 1797. Little more is known about the bridge itself but Mason was able charge 6 cents a man, 6 cents a horse. Mason died suddenly 5 years after the bridges completion. A flood in 1807 destroyed the bridge and the family had no interest in rebuilding..

And yup, that, in part, is how this area became known as Woodbridge.
