

- 3. Annapolis City Marina. Make Resv for Sun 7/16 & Mon 7/17. Go to www.annapolis.gov/harbormaster and fill out the slip resv form. Note that you are part of the Prince William Group.
- 4. Baltimore –Inner Harbor East Marina. Make Resv on Snag-a-Slip for Tues 7/18 and Wed 7/19. Note you are part of the Prince William YC Group. If needed, dockmaster Mike is at 410-625-1700.

2023 Progressive Dinner on the Docks – June 24, 2023

Ahoy PWYC boaters! We are excited to invite you to participate in this year's progressive dinner party. It is a super, one-of-a-kind event to meet fellow boaters, show off your "home away from home" (you know--your boat, your seaworthy chateau, your Potomac Palace!), see other member's classy crafts (boats!), and enjoy great food, fine drinks, and amazing friends!

This year's PWYC Progressive Dinner on the Docks will take place on Saturday, June 24th, 2023 from 5:00 pm to 10:00 pm. We are hopeful that you will choose to be a part of this unforgettable fun-filled

event. Philip and Heidi Schoepflin will be coordinating the event and can be reached at: philip.schoepflin@gmail.com.

Here's how it works:

- -There will be a total of four courses served throughout the evening. They are:
- 1) First Course- Appetizers and cocktails will kick off the evening for everyone and will be served at the deck near the Bath House located near C-Dock. This will be a chance to meet and greet all participants and share sea stories as we begin the event.
- 2) Second Course- Soup/salad course with a beverage will be served by your hosts on the first boat you will visit.
- 3) Third Course- Main dinner entrée with a beverage will be served by your hosts on the second boat you will visit.
- 4) Fourth Course is our dessert and coffeehouse finale to the event which will be hosted by the Boatel in the upstairs community room of the Blue Bath House. This will bring everyone back together to finish out the evening with continued sea tales among shipmates, sweet tooth enjoyment, beverages and more great conversation.
- -Each boat serving either a second or third course will host between 4 and 8 guests at their boat (based on group size offered by boat Captain). It's totally up to you what to serve...though you will want to make it something you can easily have ready within a few minutes of arriving to your boat from the previous course. (Hosts can leave the previous course 10 min early to prepare for the arrival of their guests.)
- -At each of your stops you will be with a new group of fellow boaters.
- -All participants, once they have RSVP'd to Philip and Heidi at: philip.schoepflin@gmail.com, will be emailed a confirmation of their attendance at the event and the course they have decided to cover.

-As mentioned previously ALL participants will meet at the deck of the Bath House near C-Dock at 5:00 pm for the First Course. It is during the First Course that you will receive an envelope containing the name and location of the boat you will report aboard for the Second Course.

This envelope will be opened upon the sounding of the boat horn signaling the end of the First Course and you will begin making your way to the Second Course host boat found within your envelope.

- -Upon completion of the Second Course, the boat horn will sound and the host boat's Captain will give you an envelope with the name and location of the boat you will enjoy your Third Course aboard. This envelope will be opened upon receipt and you will begin making your way to the Third Course host boat found within your envelope. 

Some Thoughts For July

Here is some good news and some not-so-good news with respect to life jackets. Note the importance of wearing life jackets when riding in open motorboats.

Life Jacket Statistics-Source At The End

•81%. Recreational boating-related fatalities in 2021 that resulted from falling overboard and drowning.

•400. Recreational boating-related drowning victims in 2021 alone who might still be alive today if they were wearing a life jacket.

•27%. Average increase in overall life jacket wear between 1999 and

2021. This excludes PWCs.

 42%. Relative increase in number of adults observed wearing life jackets in open motorboats since 1999. Most people who fell overboard and drowned were riding in open motorboats. Take a look at what happened here. Rough water. No life jacket.

- 37.1%. Number of adults aboard sailboats observed wearing life jackets in 2021.

Fisher People Entering Prince William Marina (PWM) Fairways To Fish

- Based on the Virginia Code below, PWM water is public space.
- Fishing inside PWM fairways on a boat is legal.
- The docks are private. Accessing PWM docks without permission is illegal. This means no tying up to a dock or leaving a vessel to climb onto a dock.
- People fish in the PWM fairways because often that is where the fish are found. As the
 water and weather warms, more and more fish will take refuge in the shade of docks and
 anglers will follow.
- It is illegal for a dock owner, marina owner, or boat owner to harass a fisherman who enters a PWM fairway and is legally engaged in their activity.
- Virginia codes governing the waterways.

Damage Caused By Errant Casting

- Because no one owns PWM water, many believe that it becomes a question of fishing etiquette rather than the law
- Unfortunately, not all those who fish exhibit the proper etiquette.
- Unfortunately, not all those who fish can cast with the accuracy needed to hit the spots aimed at.
- Torn canvass; damaged vinyl seats; dinged fiberglass and clear vinyl; lines, hooks, and weights wrapped around bow rails and dock lines can be a nuisance and under certain instances dangerous.
- Proper etiquette would be for whomever caused the problem to be responsible for solving the problem.
- All too often no one is aboard the involved vessel or the perpetrators are off and away before anyone notices the damage caused by their errant casts.
- The proper authorities will take appropriate action if they receive proof of who is responsible for the damage. It may be possible, for example, to use the PWM web cams.
- There are lots of stories about errant casts being made from those fishing close to private docks.

started boating when I was 18 years old, over on Pohick Bay. My friend Billy and I announced to our parents that we were now *men* and we were going to buy a boat. After all, we were 18 what more could we possibly need to learn. MEN!! After their laughter settled, the men set off to purchase our boat. I believe it was a 17' Silverline (silver something) and Billy had an S10 pickup truck. We were men!! The boat was beautiful, well it was to an 18 year old.

Billy got the boat running and I got it sort of shiny, installed a radio and away we went. Of course, the truck was nearly too small to pull it and struggled going up and down the hills and at the ramp. But, it was ours. Billy's dad said to us, "Boy's do NOT leave Pohick and stay away from Hallowing Point." But, I'm pretty sure what we *heard* was "Boys, there's great skiing out on the point and you should really check out the ride to DC."

For the rest of the summer, we learned to ski and I even got to be pretty good at slalom. Multiple attempts at barefoot skiing resulted in at least one trip to the hospital. We learned that Billy was easily distracted by 18 year old women in bikinis. This distraction taught us to understand the hazards of shallow water at speed. We learned that running out of gas with those same ladies on the boat requires one to climb the fence at the Alexandria waterfront, walk several blocks to the Sunoco, convince the attendant that we needed the 5 gallon gas can and we'd have to make that walk 5 times before we were confident we had enough fuel to get home. Oddly enough, those ladies didn't go boating with us ever again! Shocking!!

e sold the boat at the end of the summer when Billy moved away. The memories of that summer stick with me like scenes from the iconic movie "The Sandlot". For years I yearned to get back to the river and try to relive some of those memories. Today, I'm a commercial captain on a 200+ passenger tour boat in Annapolis and I watched my kids love boating as they grew up in the very waters on which I became a man!
