Your Checklists Really, Really Help

As normal, what follows are the thoughts of one person. Everyone is on their own out there.

Atul Gawande is a surgeon who wrote a great book titled, The Checklist Manifesto How To Get Things Right, Henry Holt & Co., 2009.He provides numerous examples of how operating room personnel use checklists to save lives.

According to Wikipedia, a checklist is an aid used to reduce the chances of failure or a poor performance by compensating for potential limits of human memory and attention. According to those who use checklists, one that is properly constructed can help to ensure consistency and completeness in carrying out a task.

People who make use of checklists vary from airline pilots, to surgeons, to those of us who use a grocery shopping list. Boaters at Prince William Marina certainly fall somewhere on this continuum.

Some questions on a checklist may appear to be obvious. For example, on YouTube is a 21 minute and 12 second video outlining a trip on an Air France 747 from Paris, France to Mexico City, Mexico.

At about the 10 minute and 38 second mark the plane is being brought in for the landing and the Captain asks the co-pilot to read to him out loud the landing checklist. It is a short checklist. One of the questions on the check list is whether or not the landing gear is down (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8JT-a02n_CQ</u>).

Putting together unique checklists or Googling topics such as "Anchoring Checklist" or "How to Raft Up With Other Boats" is a great way to spend the non-boating months.

Here Here is one way to start putting together a checklist.Remember that checklists even on the same type of vessel may vary depending on how the vessel is used. (<u>https://www.canva.com/learn/ultimate-guide-creating-check</u>).

Step 1—Do a brain dump by writing down everything thought to be important to complete the task. Don't hold back. Make the list as comprehensive as possible. Thoughts can be eliminated later on.

Step 2—Organize/prioritize. Figure out which items are the most important and or urgent. Eliminate items when necessary.

Step 3—Assemble the most important items into a checklist in order of priority. Step 4--Continue to add, eliminate, and re-arrange items as needed to help an audience understand what is wanted.

Developing decent checklists for our purposes while not unreasonably difficult usually takes some thought. If one Googles the words "Making A Good Checklist," a ton of helpful sources will pop up.

Checklists are especially valuable when we are forced outside of our comfort zone. For example, preparing to leave the slip on a beautiful summer day for a day on the water with guests aboard is a situation ripe for forgetting something important.And, we all know how distracting children can be.

There is no reason, for example, to attempt to exit a slip at Prince William Marina before dropping an aft spring line, travel the Potomac with fenders flapping in the wind, or neglecting to brief inexperienced guests on proper safety while on the water.

Here is a SAMPLE checklist to use when first entering a vessel until exiting a slip. •Turn on the battery switches.

•Check oil, fluids, belts, batteries, generator oil, connections, clamps, etc. in the bilge. •Turn on the blower switch. Let it run for at least 4 minutes.

 $\cdot Take$ down and store the curtains. Make sure the clips are in place.

•Turn off all 120/12 volt switches and the shore power switch at the distribution box. •Bring up PFDs, clothes, chart book, binoculars, flag, secure the refrigerator.

•Turn on the ignition keys. Start the engines. Wait until the operating temperature hits 170 degrees. During cold weather, push in the black buttons and advance the throttles.



SAFETY OFFICER CONT.

- . Turn on any needed 12 volt appliances at the distribution box.
- \cdot Center and lock the helm seat and place the riser in front of the helm.

 \cdot Turn on the VHF/depth finder/GPS/set the 3500 shallow water depth alarm if desired/Make sure the AIS is turned on.

 \cdot Center the steering wheel in preparation for leaving the slip.

•Check on the throttle handle. Be sure that the stern drives are in and the bow is down.Check that the trim tabs on the dash are all the way bow up.

- Disconnect and store the yellow shore power cord.
- \cdot Check for floating debris around the boat and in the fairway.
- \cdot Take in the fenders and lines in the proper order after observing the wind, tide, etc.
- \cdot Turn off the blower.
- \cdot Put out the flag.
- \cdot Look both ways before leaving the slip.
- \cdot Give one prolonged 4 to 6 second blast of the horn before leaving the slip.
- $\cdot\,$ Give one prolonged 4 to 6 second blast of the horn before exiting the fairway and entering the river.

Here is a SAMPLE guest(s) aboard checklist.

- We need to go over some things before we leave the dock.
 - \checkmark Stop me if you have any question.
- The object for today is enjoyment.
- \checkmark No one has to go anywhere.
- \checkmark Let me know if you want to return to the dock and we will return
- \checkmark Let me know if you feel sick while on the boat and we will deal with it.
- Things can happen quickly due to wind, waves, swells, rain, other boats, etc.
- \checkmark When you move around there should be one hand for you and one for the boat.
- \checkmark Three points of contact.
- \checkmark Hold on, preferably with two hands, to something solid when standing.
- On this boat, it is illegal to ride on the bow.
- Run through putting on the life jackets.
 - √There is nothing wrong with wearing a jacket full time.

In this vessel underway, children under 13 must wear an appropriate Coast Guard-approved PFD, unless they are below decks or in an enclosed cabin.

- \checkmark Keep the life jackets in a handy place if they are not being worn.
- No helping with anything unless asked.



SAFETY OFFICER CONT.

- Keep hands and feet inside the boat at all times.
- \cdot Stay seated when leaving the slip and docking.
- We want to take as much weight as possible when going on plane. $\sqrt[4]{I}$ will warn you when we are about to go on plane.
- \checkmark Move off the back bench, spread out, and remain sitting.
- •Show location of emergency flares.
- •Explain channel 16 on the radio.
- •Explain how to give latitude and longitude if the chart plotter is on.
- •Show the location of the first aid kit.
- •Show the locations of the fire extinguishers.
- \checkmark Show how to use the fire extinguishers.
- •Explain what to do if someone falls overboard.
- \checkmark Whoever first sees the person fall into the water yells "Man Overboard."
- -Whoever first sees the person fall overboard points and keeps pointing to the person.
- -Whoever first sees the overboard person, NEVER takes their eye off the person and NEVER stop pointing at the person in the water.
- -Someone else jettisons quickly anything that floats as close to the person as possible.
- -Everyone else puts on their life jackets.
- •Using the head.
- \checkmark We will use the on-board head when necessary.
- \checkmark Does anyone have to use the restroom before we leave the dock.
- \checkmark Only the special toilet paper.


